PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents and Caregivers

Last Wednesday at Chapel, we observed Ash Wednesday, which marks 40 days till Good Friday and Easter. Students were invited to have a small cross, marked with ash / charcoal, on their forehead or the back of their hand. Why is it "Ash Wednesday"? Ash is all that remains after life has been destroyed. Totally destroyed. Look at ashes, and you must think of what has been destroyed, and what destroyed it. On Ash Wednesday, many who follow Jesus wear a mark of ash, a cross, to symbolize how we will follow Jesus to discover how he intends to deal with everything that destroys life.

Early in the Gospels, we read about Jesus spending 40 days alone in the wilderness. This was a testing time for him, in which he needed to sort out whether or not he was up to the challenges coming his way, the Cross of Good Friday in particular. Ash Wednesday is about challenging ourselves to follow Jesus, all the way to that moment he gives his life for us.



Mark 10:32-34 Back on the road, they set out for Jerusalem. Jesus had a head start on them, and they were following, puzzled and not just a little afraid. He took the Twelve and began again to go over what to expect next. "Listen to me carefully. We're on our way up to Jerusalem. When we get there, the Son of Man will be betrayed to the religious leaders and scholars. They will sentence him to death. Then they will hand him over to the Romans, who will mock and spit on him, give him the third degree, and kill him. After three days he will rise alive."

FROM THE HEAD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING

Oral language is an essential skill for both social interactions and academic understanding. We use oral language throughout our day to ask questions, give instructions, make requests and interact with others. Every social interaction that your child engages in, is a new opportunity to practice their oral language.

There are some simple ways that you can help your child to practice their oral language and interaction skills. Here are some ways that you can engage orally with your child:

- Ask them questions about their favourite things.
- Have some dinner time conversations and have everyone share a 'high point' in their day.
- Tell jokes to each other and focus on not only the words being said, but the timing of the delivery of the words and pausing for effect.

Share stories from your childhood and encourage your child to share stories from when they were younger.

Oral language is an essential skill for learning and for life. Enjoy talking with your child and having them talk with you about what matters most to them.
