YOU ARE OF GREAT VALUE

FROM THE HEAD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING

The Daily 5 is an integral part of our learning program. When students at St Paul's choose books from the GLAD Centre for their book box, the teachers meet with them to check that the book is a 'good fit' book for them. The acronym 'I P.I.C.K.' is used to assess a 'good fit' book:

P - Purpose

What is my purpose for reading?

I - Interest

Is the book interesting to me?

C - Comprehend

Do I understand what I am reading?

K - Know

Do I know most of the words?

Research shows when children are reading independently, they should be reading books they understand and can read. Reading books that are too difficult can lead to frustration, inability to understand the story, and then reading is no longer enjoyable. We want our students to enjoy reading, which means it is important they are reading books they are both interested in, and are at just the right level for them to be able to read and understand.

We have had around 20 eager students from Year 3-6 nominate to enter the BEBRAS computational thinking competition. The competition will occur on



INSIDE STORY: YEAR 2

Last Friday Year 2 went on an Aboriginal Heritage Trail operated by the Abbey Museum.

They visited three special places important to the local Aboriginal people. The first stop was an Aboriginal Bora Ring, the second stop was a Glass House Mountain lookout and the third was Little Rocky Creek. If you see a Year 2 student around the school, please ask them what they learned about these significant places in our local region.







Senior Japanese

In Year 4, we have been learning about Katakana (one of three writing types in Japan) and how to write our name in katakana too. For example, "Miller Sensei" is written as "ミラー・センセイ" in katakana. Key vocabulary have included 'douzo' (どうぞ) which means 'please', 'kindly', 'by all means' or 'here you are' when handing something to someone. In Japan, people receive and give items with two hands so the students have practised this skill using vocabulary like, 'douzo' and 'arigatou gozaimasu'

(ありがとうございます- thank you very much) in a fun Pikachu and Poke-ball passing and receiving Japanese game!

Year 5 and Year 6 have explored a 5 week mini-unit about 'What's in a Japanese name?' They have been carefully trying to identify and recognise similarities and differences between katakana, hiragana and kanji writing types. Students have enjoyed using a red pen to write the date in Japanese using kanji symbols for the day, date and month.

For example, Thursday 5th March is written backwards as 3月5日(木). A real life, authentic problem was presented to the students as Miller Sensei gave each partner group a copy of her Shinkansen (bullet train) tickets and they had to problem solve to work out the date, time and year of the shinkansen trip. Students have also enjoyed singing a popular Japanese Nursery Rhyme called, "童謡 - Panda, Usagi, Koara" (パンダうさぎコアラ) which is an animal song about a panda, rabbit and a koala.
