Positive Partnerships – Parents and School

Parents, families, and carers are a child's first and most important teachers. When families and schools work together children's learning is enhanced.

Partnerships for learning and wellbeing are about parents and carers, schools and communities working together to ensure that every parent can play a positive role in their child's learning, school community, sport, and social life.

Parents and families play a vital role in supporting their child's education. Research has shown that when schools and families work together, children:

- do better in school
- stay in school longer
- are more engaged with their schoolwork
- go to school more regularly
- behave better
- have better social skills.

Taking Risks - Part 1

There are so many areas to unpack with this topic that I would like to explore. Let's start with in the classroom and considering types of risks.

- Calculated risk Where we consider the reward or consequence of our choice and deem the potential reward to be worth the risk. E.g. 'I know my coffee might go cold by the time I get to drink it, but I still want it!'
- Impulsive risk Without considering outcomes, acting before thinking. E.g. 'I have to run, quick, I can't get tagged, I don't want to be tagged..... Bump, oops! I didn't see that person there playing!'
- Conservative risk Thought is made on the possible outcome, but the reward may not seem worthwhile compared to the element of risk involved. E.g. 'I know the reward for winning the Kahoot quiz is to choose a game to play, but I don't really want the pressure of choosing something someone else doesn't like!'

Engaging in classroom learning and embracing new challenges enriches our experience and fosters growth through the courage to take risks. Having a go, asking questions and not being worried about the answer or result is commonly encouraged, yet too often it is the fear of being wrong or embarrassed to say the wrong thing that might hold us back. But, unless we start to take those risks, the hesitation stays with us into adulthood. Can you think of a recent experience when someone asked a question to a large group (maybe a work meeting, a show or event, a study course perhaps) and nobody wanted to share an answer or opinion?

While we encourage everyone to speak up and remind them that no question is a bad one, it's equally important to foster understanding of why taking learning risks is so valuable and how it contributes to growth.

- Opinion Having discussions and stating opinions are a life skill and one well practiced in adulthood. As there
 is no right or wrong opinion, there is no right or wrong answer. 'Its my opinion that it's England's turn to win the
 ashes this time!'
- **Perseverance** Having a go doesn't mean it will be right. Keep trying and you will find out so much from what doesn't work.
- Safe, supportive environment— When everyone in the space has the same opportunity and support, there is no judgement, there is no danger. A supportive environment where people encourage each other and we are not afraid to be wrong is important.
- **Mistakes** We are so put off by mistakes, where instead we should embrace every possible one we make. We learn more from our mistakes than successes. (I'd like to dig deeper into this another time.)
- **Confidence** The more you try, the better you get. The better you get, the more confident you become. The more confident you become, the more risks you take and so the cycle continues.
- **Problem Solving** Not problems, but opportunities with a challenge. I love puzzles; thinking puzzles, riddles. I don't want to know the answer quickly (What do I learn by asking Google or Siri?). I want the challenge of working it out. I may need to know some background information in order to solve the challenge, but the intrinsic reward for achieving something independently adds to the confidence part and feeling successful.

So, when we take a risk in learning, we have nothing to lose. There is no physical danger. The risk is down to what we want to achieve from making the choice. As adults, we all have plenty of examples of choices we made in life that were risks. Some were so worth it, others maybe not. But imagine not making some of them!

Listening Skills

Stories are a powerful part of how we communicate as humans. Fishing stories are told by those who return from a deep sea fishing expedition with tales of catches bigger than an arm span, moral tales are told to children to discourage them from making unwise choices, parables are used in the bible to illustrate biblical truths, creative narratives are spun to justify reasons for the new pair of shoes in the wardrobe. Whatever the reason for sharing stories, there is no denying that they are part what it is to be human.

Winch, March, Ljungdahl & Holliday (2014) offer the following insights to highlight the importance of stories in our cultures and society in their book, *Literacy: Reading, Writing and Children's Literature*:

"Stories are part of every country in the world, valued as part of national heritages. Traditionally, books are stories in a permanent form that can be passed around, read and reread, celebrated as culture, treasured as cultural capital."

A powerful element of story telling is using oral language to communicate and using our listening skills to understand what someone is communicating to us. Listening skills are built into English in the Australian Curriculum, and one of the ways that we develop these essential communication skills at St Paul's is through discussion groups.

Discussion groups are held in classrooms across the school during Short Term Planning Cycles in English. Teachers facilitate small group discussions where students use interaction skills to listen, ask questions, respond and respectfully interact with their peers. In Year 1, students may discuss their favourite character in a book. In Year 6, students may analyse the chapter of a novel. Discussion groups are used for a range of different purposes to encourage our students to grow in their listening and interaction skills.

Some ways that you can support your child at home to develop their listening skills include:

- Get a library card to the Moreton Bay City Council Library, where you can access free audiobooks for you and your child to listen to.
- Listen to a podcast as a family on your next family road trip. Podcasts help to develop your child's
 listening and comprehension skills and they provide great points of conversation for the family dinner
 table (my children used to love listening to Story Pirates where children send their stories into the Story
 Pirates and the stories are transformed into sketch comedy and songs).
- Read aloud to your child. Reading novels as a family is an opportunity not only to develop listening
 skills but to strengthen the family bond through a shared experience. Books like Charlotte's Web, Nim's
 Island and The Bad Guys 1 are great shared reading experiences what also have a movie that you
 can watch as a family after reading the book.

From the Library (GLAD Centre)



This year we are celebrating Scholastic's Family Reading Month in May. It's an awesome opportunity to take the time to engage with stories and books with your children. The GLAD Centre has taken advantage of some of the events in May to help us all celebrate.

Firstly, I am delighted to invite all St Paul's students to join in the 2025 Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC).

The PRC is not a competition but a way to encourage students to develop a love of reading for life. Students are encouraged to select a range of fiction and non-fiction books suited to their reading ability and record books read during the reading period, from 6 May to 22 August. Download the <u>Reader Form</u> to record the books.

To complete the challenge:

- Prep to Year 2 must read or experience at least 20 books
- Years 3 and 4 must read at least 20 books
- Years 5 and 6 must read at least 15 books

Experiencing books can include shared reading, listening to stories, or reading picture books. The aim for the 2025 challenge is to encourage students to make time to read. Last year saw more than 216,000 children from around the state participate.

Every student who completes the challenge, and returns the completed record reader form, will receive a Certificate of Achievement. I look forward to seeing as many of our students as possible take part in the 2025 Premier's Reading Challenge.

Secondly, our first Scholastic Book Fair will be held from Friday 9th to Wednesday 14th May! This Pop-Up Book Store will be in the GLAD Centre for you to visit before (8:00-8:30am) and after (3:00-3:30pm) school. It has a great range of books for you to purchase, with prices starting from \$5. Please note that the Book Fair is cashless and accepts EFTPOS card only payments. Finally, on Wednesday 20th May, National Simultaneous Storytime is on! National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 25th successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the Australian Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.



This year's book is called *The Truck Cat* (written by Deborah Frenkel) and it tells the story of a cat who travels Australia on a truck and who learns that home can be anywhere.

I hope to see you taking the time to participate in one of these events over Family Reading Month, and to take the time to read with and talk about books with your children.

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From our Chappy


